Sounds 2025 Week 13: Small Steps God Multiplies

Introduction and Context

"Give careful thought to your ways" (Hag 1:5, 7).

Not just what choices we're making, but how we're making them and why.

Key People & Roles in This Week's Reading

- **Haggai Prophet** (520 BC) whose short, pointed sermons restart the stalled work, calling the people to "give careful thought to your ways" (Hag 1–2; Ezra 5:1; 6:14).
- **Zechariah Prophet** (520–518 BC), priestly background; offers visions and encouragement: "Not by might... but by my Spirit" and God's joy over small beginnings (Zech 1–6; Ezra 5:1; 6:14).
- **Ezra Priest-scribe** and later leader of a subsequent return (458 BC). He compiles the narrative; in **Ezra 3–6** he is not yet on the scene, but his book records Zerubbabel/Joshua's rebuild and the ministry of Haggai and Zechariah (Ezra 5–6).
- The Remnant The returned community preserved by God through exile—a small but faithful people who respond to the word, fear the Lord, and resume the work (called "the remnant" in Hag 1:12, 14; 2:2). Numbered in Ezra's lists at about 42,360 plus servants/singers (Ezra 2:64–65).
- **Zerubbabel son of Shealtiel** Governor of Judah, descendant of **David**; civil leader of the first return from exile and the temple rebuild (Ezra 2:2; 3:2; 5:2; Hag 1:1; Zech 4:6–10).
- Joshua (Jeshua) son of Jozadak High priest who partners with Zerubbabel; represents spiritual leadership during the rebuild (Ezra 3:2; 5:2; Hag 1:1, 12, 14; Zech 3:1–5).
 - In Hebrew, Joshua (often Jeshua) is Yeshuʿa—the same name rendered lēsous in Greek, Jesus in our New Testament (cf. Matt 1:21). Jesus is the Greek form of Joshua, which means the Lord saves.

The Problem

Haggai 1:2 Ezra 4:4–5 Haggai 1:4

- Ezra names the stall:
- · Haggai names the heart behind the stall;
- Zechariah names the power that overcomes it: "'Not by might nor by power, but by my Spirit,' says the Lord Almighty" (Zechariah 4:6).

"Give careful thought to your ways" (Haggai 1:5, 7).

Stop the blur. Look at the outcomes:

Haggai 1:6

"By their fruit you will recognize them." (Matt 7:16, 20)

Scripture calls us to "test everything; hold on to what is good" (1 Thessalonians 5:21) and to "consider the outcome of their way of life" (Hebrews 13:7). Jesus directs our discernment: good trees bear good fruit. If the fruit is repentance, restoration, mission, mercy, and multigenerational life—that is where the Lord is at work.

Haggai 1:9

Provision is not the reward of self-priority; it is the **fruit of God-first living**.

"'Return to me,' declares the Lord Almighty, 'and I will return to you." (Zechariah 1:3).

What would it look like to make God's pleasure and honor the true north of my decisions?

The Solution

Haggai 1:8
"I always do what pleases him." (John 8:29)
"Father, glorify your name!" (John 12:28)
1 Corinthians 3:16–17
Ezra 5:1–2

Word → Work → "Withness."

A prophetic **word** from God leads to obedient **work**, sustained by God's "**withness**"— His presence and encouragement through the prophets.

Zechariah 4:6-9

Ephesians 3:20—21

He who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion until the day of Christ Jesus. (Philippians 1:6).

Zechariah 4:10

"the seven eyes of the Lord." God sees. God knows. God is with His builders.

Application—Small Steps God Multiplies

God's Spirit empowers the start, levels obstacles, multiplies our offering, and secures the finish—to His glory in the church (Ephesians 3:21).

For us, "bring down timber" (Haggai 1:8) looks like aligning our time, talent, and treasure.

Game Changer and into Advanced Commitment Night this Friday

- Are my budgets and my calendars preaching the same gospel as my lips?
- Have I grown busy with my house while God's house—His mission through Ekklesia—waits?

Haggai 1:12–13 Haggai 1:14 Zechariah 4:6–7

- 1. **Don't negotiate God's priorities into "later."** There will never be a perfectly convenient season to put His work first. But there is always grace to start today.
- 2. **Consider your ways.** If your efforts feel thin, if your "purse" keeps leaking, let that holy dissatisfaction lead you back to the joy of God-first living.

1. Hands to the work

- **Haggai 2:4** "Be strong... **and work**. For I am with you," declares the Lord.
- Haggai 1:8 "Go up... bring down timber and build my house, so that I may take pleasure in it and be honored."
- Haggai 1:14 "So the Lord stirred up the spirit... and they came and began to work on the house of the Lord."

2. Hearts stirred by His presence

- Haggai 1:13 "I am with you, declares the Lord."
- Haggai 2:4–5 "I am with you... My Spirit remains among you. Do not fear"
- **Haggai 1:14** "The Lord **stirred up the spirit** of Zerubbabel... Joshua... and the whole remnant..."
- 3. Commitments that declare: "Your house, Your honor, Your mission—first."
 - Haggai 1:7–8 "Give careful thought to your ways... build my house, so that I may take pleasure in it and be honored."
 - **Haggai 1:9** "Because of **my house, which remains a ruin**, while each of you is **busy with your own house**."
 - Haggai 1:12 "Then the whole remnant obeyed the voice of the Lord... and the people feared the Lord."

Conclusion

"Is it a time for you to live in paneled houses while this house lies in ruins?" (Hag 1:4). Jesus frames it: store treasure in heaven (Matt 6:19–21).

Our response:

- 1. Pray: "Lord, show me where I'm washing rental cars. Reorder my loves. Your house, Your honor, Your mission—first."
- 2. Take one **obedient step**—time, talent, treasure. Trust God for the **capstone** (Zech 4:7,10).
- 3. Bring your 'yes' to Advance Commitment Night.
